

### *From the Pastor's Desk*

This weekend our nation observes the 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the horrific terrorist attacks of Sep. 11<sup>th</sup>, 2001. And as we look at the recent situation with the Taliban in Afghanistan, we are reminded that terrorism continues to threaten the lives of people around the globe. One of the main mantras to come out of 9/11 was “We will never forget.” It is true that we cannot and should not become complacent and forget what happened on that terrible day, for as the saying goes: “Those who forget history are condemned to repeat it.” But as we remember what happened in 2001, and as we look at our world today in 2021, we need to also remember that our Savior Jesus Christ has promised to never leave us. When He established His Church on earth, He said that “the gates of the netherworld shall not prevail against it.” (Mt. 16:18). And, when He sent the Apostles out to preach right before He ascended to heaven, He said, “Behold, I am with you always, until the end of the age.” (Mt. 28:20). Confident in knowing that our God is always with us, let us strive to be people of peace with those around us, that the peace of Christ might spread throughout the world.

On another note, I would like to update everyone on some recent news regarding the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) loans that we received in summer 2020 and early 2021 – and I’m sharing this news because it has implications for some items that affect parishioners. As you may remember, in August of 2020 we applied for PPP loans for both St. Beatrice and St. Maria Goretti. St. Beatrice’s loan was forgiven in January. I’m happy to say that we recently received word that SMG’s loan has now been forgiven! The SMG forgiveness took longer because it was a much larger loan (because of SMG School), and because the school closed in June 2020, that complicated the forgiveness process. But the short story is that it was finally forgiven.

When the government offered the second round of PPP loans in February 2021, we received a second loan for St. Beatrice (even though our parishes had united into Holy Virgin Martyrs at that time, our tax ID is still in St. Beatrice’s name, so we had to apply for the second loan under that name). The portal to apply for forgiveness for the second-round loans is now open, and just this week we submitted our application.

I mention all this because this is the reason why we have not yet received the revised federal tax ID for our parish. You see, if we had changed identities, that could complicate the forgiveness of our second PPP loan. Once we know that our second loan will be forgiven, we can then receive our new tax ID, and once that happens, we can then make important changes like getting new parish bank accounts and new parishioner donation envelopes with the Holy Virgin Martyrs name.

And keep in mind that we’re continuing to work on publicizing our new parish name and logo (if you missed my explanation of the new parish logo, see my article in our Aug. 15<sup>th</sup> bulletin, and our bulletins can always be found on our parish website). This week we are installing new signs on the rectory and the Rel. Ed. building with our name and logo. We have also ordered a large banner that we plan to install in the prayer garden on the outside of church. And down the road, if funds become available, we would like to purchase a new marquee for Irving Park Rd.

Finally, I know I had said that I would be talking about a fundraiser for our new parish hall this weekend, but I’m pushing that off for one more week. For now, please know that this new hall is part of the Renew My Church process of helping new parishes to become vibrant communities where the Catholic faith will be handed on for generations – and I hope that you will be willing to support that important goal.

Holy Virgin Martyrs, pray for us. May God bless you.

### Offering and Intercessions

In this holy moment—with the consecrated bread and wine, the Body and Blood of Christ, upon the altar—we pray for a share in the fruits of Christ's sacrifice. We offer to God what God has given to us, and we intercede for the Church and the world. We pray for the pope and for all the bishops, and we mention the bishop of our local church by name. We pray for the clergy and for all the people of God. We pray in a special way for those who have died. And we pray for ourselves, that one day, with Mary and all the saints, we may come to that place where Jesus already reigns. These prayers of intercession, like the General Intercessions earlier in the Mass, broaden our focus and remind us that the Eucharist is offered not just for those gathered, but for the salvation of the entire world. The Eucharistic Prayer leads us from an intense focus on Christ, present in the consecrated host in the hands of the priest, to a loving sweep of prayer that embraces the world.

## IT'S ALL ABOUT CONTROL

From toddlerhood to old age, we grow in mastery of our own lives, our bodies, and our destiny. This mastery is hard won, and we don't let go of autonomy easily. Much of this self-mastery involves the avoidance of pain or discomfort, so when we hear things like "take up your cross" and "lose your life," we tend to resist the message.

James says that faith without works is dead. Ouch! That is really a direct message! One way to look at this, as well as the part about losing our life to find it, is that faith is a process of more and more openness to God's direction of our lives. It is very hard for us to give up control, but perhaps what we are being asked to do is not to become passive and babyish, but to allow God to direct where our self-mastery will lead and what it will accomplish. We are asked to relinquish the need to control the results of our efforts; to risk, as Jesus did, the loss of everything we are working to achieve. We are asked to let God take the lead and to control the results, even though we may never see those results.





Hi HVM parishioners,

I have a volunteer opportunity for anyone interested in being able to bring Communion to the home bound. We are looking for some new recruits to be part of our Ministers of Care team. We already have a good group that are very devoted but looking to expand as we now have united our two former parishes. There is a training class which will be held at St Benedict Village, Nursing and Rehabilitation, in Niles. The five-week training for new Ministers of Care will begin Wednesday, September 29th and continue thru the next 4 consecutive Wednesday evenings until October 27th, from 7-9 pm. Chaplain Rick Nash and retired priests who live at St. Benedict will, be facilitating these classes. There is no charge to you for this course, and I can tell you from personal experience it's a very rewarding ministry to be able to bring Jesus (Communion) to your fellow parishioners who can't come to church for themselves. It's not a big commitment a phone call to set up a time, and about 20mins. to visit, pray and bring communion. It could be once a week but can be even less than that. ## Flu shots

We will be offering Flu shots in the back of church on Tuesday October 5th after the morning mass from 9:15- 10:15AM. We will be able to offer both the standard dose and the high dose flu vaccines this year. The high dose vaccine is needed for immune suppressed individuals and recommended for seniors over 65. It is free to all those on


Medicare, please bring your card, so we have the number to fill the form out for billing. Anyone under 65 the cost will be \$25. We ask you to call the rectory to reserve your vaccine and give your name and which vaccine you wish to receive (Standard or High dose), so we have enough for everyone who wants the vaccine. If you have any questions call the rectory with your name and number and I will get back to you.

Also, anyone who is homebound and wishes to get the flu shot call the rectory with your name, address, and phone number. I will be bringing flu shots to the homebound later that same day October 5th.

CDC recommends everyone 6 months of age and older to get a flu vaccine every year. Flu vaccines can reduce flu illnesses, doctors' visits, and missed work and school due to flu, as well as prevent flu-related hospitalizations and deaths.

# If you wish to come after me you must deny yourself, take up your cross, and follow me.

Mark 8:34

## SUFFERING, HOPE, AND LOVE

Our readings from Isaiah and from the Gospel of Mark confront us with the fact that the invitation to faith leads us into suffering. In Isaiah, the prophet accepts pain and shaming from others, as he trusts in God. In Mark, Jesus is blunt about this: “Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me.” When we embrace faith, we are confronted with our own fears about suffering and about losing comfort, status, and control over our lives. Life has plenty of suffering already, so why choose to add to it? Jesus points to a response: avoiding our fears and clinging to illusion and superficial comforts will not give us what we really want from life. Jesus offers a better, deeper life, a life grounded in God’s love. It is lived in hope of resurrection and the final triumph of this love.

## A DIFFERENT LIFE

The Gospel of Mark reaches a turning point in today’s passage. About halfway through Mark, Jesus’ disciples begin to understand Jesus as the Messiah (or Christ). And Jesus begins to spell out just what is expected of those who follow him. The story then shifts to learning just what being Christ, and following Christ, actually means. Jesus shatters the expectation of a political or military power defeating Israel’s oppressors, and reveals a different kind of Messiah. The disciples later come to see that this different Messiah offers a different understanding of power, and of life itself.

We inhabit a world that honors power over others, through wealth or achievement or violence. Jesus invites us into a community and a way of life that honors the power of love and service to others. Lived fully, it is truly a different way of life. It is marked by great suffering and great joy, because it embraces the fundamental pattern of the death and resurrection of Jesus.

## A “LARGE” FAITH

The letter of James is designed to enlarge your faith. James knew that his community faced trials that could lead them to abandon the faith, or perhaps to reduce faith to a comfortable, manageable size. In today’s passage, James calls the reader to resist reducing faith to safe, intellectual assent to teachings, and instead to expand one’s faith to actively engage in good works, especially in service to the poor.

To have a “large” faith is to move from apathy toward others’ sufferings to empathy and to action. A large faith leads to a large heart, where we can take in the enormity of suffering in the world around us, not become overwhelmed by it, and do what we can to relieve it. With a large heart, we can even squarely face our own sufferings, accepting our own tragedies with forgiveness and hope, and walking in empathy with all who share in suffering.
